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From Rev. Catherine Wagstaff -

As a good Methodist I went to a Church of England school! Life was punctuated by special services in the Christian and the school calendar. Ascension Day was always a big event, the choir had to prepare lots of special music, and the vicar of the local church was invited in to lead a service including, of course, a sermon. To be honest I made very little of it, especially in my early years. There was a very good point in that there were no lessons for the rest of the day(!) but with the good came the bad and I must confess that I, along with my friends, did find it a little bit boring!

As I got older it seemed to take on a bit more significance for me but really I could only see it as a poor relation to Easter. Easter surely held far greater significance - Ascension seemed to offer very little really to get excited about.

Ascension Day falls 40 days after Easter and as I write, we have just celebrated it. It is the day, as the name suggests, when we remember that Christ was taken up into heaven in full view of the disciples, after telling them that he would send the Holy Spirit and that they were to become his witnesses to all the world. But it's not just a small 'side show' that happened between Easter and Pentecost, as I used to think – only worthy of note in order that I could have a day off my lessons!

For the Ascension signifies two major truths that Christians can celebrate every day of their lives. Firstly, the disciples saw their risen Lord ascending in majesty - their Lord and Saviour was King over death and Lord over *all*. 'Jesus is Lord' became their early creed... their Lord, our Lord is Lord over all, seated at the right hand of God praying for us, he is King of all Kings, Lord of all Lords! Secondly, when Jesus was on earth his birth, ministry, death and resurrection all happened within the confines of time and place.

The events of the Gospels inevitably happened at a particular moment of time amongst a restricted number of people. At his Ascension however Jesus was for ever released from the bondage of time and place and from this point on and particularly after the outpouring of the Holy Spirit it could be claimed that Christ is everywhere not limited by geography or history but Christ for *all*, in all places at all times forever; our Lord Jesus Christ is Lord of all, for all eternity.

If you look at the story that St Luke gives us in Acts 1:1-11, one of my favourite quotes is to be found there... for Luke tells us that, after the disciples had seen Jesus go up into heaven, an angel asked the disciples, 'Why do you stand here looking at the sky?' Well, I guess that should've been obvious – the disciples are looking upwards because that's the direction that Jesus has gone in!!! But reading between the lines what I think the angel may be saying is, 'Don't hang around here. Get on with it! Go and serve your Lord and King, go and be the witnesses he has called you to be.' It's no good looking up into the sky, that's not going to get you very far is it?! Get going just as Jesus says. Be filled with the Holy Spirit, with power from on high, and go out into your communities and into the world and tell, live, the Good News. And of course that's exactly what the disciples did...

That same Holy Spirit fills us today and calls us to do the same. Don't hang around here! Jesus is Lord over all, with us for all time and in all places and he is calling us to share the best news the world can ever hear and know - that God loves us to the uttermost. That's got to be even better than a day without school lessons...!




What matters


Another item from Jennie -

A magpie applied for the receptionist job at a large commercial office. The interviewer, a bit non-plussed, told the magpie that the candidate had to be




able to type at least 80 words per minute. The magpie demonstrated a 100 wpm talent!


